Dear AAPL Members:

As we reflect on the past fiscal year with gratitude, we are proud to present the achievements of our association. This year has been marked by significant progress and success in financial stewardship and enhanced membership services, underscoring our collective commitment to serving AAPL members, advancing the land profession and enhancing the energy industry.

First and foremost, we are thrilled to report that we have successfully balanced our budget, ensuring financial stability and enabling us to invest further in initiatives that benefit our members and the broader industry. This achievement is a testament to the diligent efforts and strategic planning of our executive committee, board of directors, standing committees and exemplary staff. Along with these budget efforts, a deep dive into our staff occurred simultaneously, and the result appears that the energy level and optimism has increased many times over. This should reverberate throughout the entire organization in the coming years.

One of the year's notable achievements was our increased advocacy efforts, which saw remarkable success with the passage of SB 604 through the Texas House and Senate, culminating in the governor's signature. This legislative victory represents a significant step forward in our ongoing efforts to support landmen and their interests. In addition, more than 600 legislative bills were tracked daily.

Education and certification opportunities continue to be cornerstones of our mission with a wide variety of professional development offerings. This year we produced six robust Energy Institutes in regions including Texas, the Gulf Coast, the Southwest, the Rockies, the Appalachian area and Nevada. These regional institutes have provided valuable learning opportunities and networking platforms, contributing to the ongoing growth and excellence of our profession. We also honored 189 members who earned their CPL, RPL and RL certification designations.

A highlight this fiscal year was the launch of the Women in Energy Institute, a groundbreaking initiative that received rave reviews from across the industry. This institute represents a significant step toward fostering diversity and inclusion within our field, and its success has set a new standard for how we support and elevate women in energy.

Additionally, implementing the Alliance Program significantly enhanced our relationships with 11 major exploration and production companies. This initiative has strengthened our industry connections and fostered collaboration that will benefit all stakeholders involved. We will continue to seek out opportunities to align with E&P companies to help strengthen the the level of services to the energy industry.

Our efforts in organizing and hosting events have also been met with great success. The 2024 NAPE Summit attracted more than 8,100 attendees, and we are proud to have donated more than \$300,000 this year to NAPE Charities, benefiting veterans charities that support our American heroes. Furthermore, our Annual Meeting in Boston was a resounding success, with a soldout attendance that highlighted the enthusiasm and engagement of our membership.

These accomplishments are a direct result of the dedication and hard work of our members, volunteers and staff. As we move forward, we are excited about the opportunities ahead and confident in our continued ability to drive progress and foster excellence in the land profession and energy industry.

Thank you for your unwavering support and commitment to AAPL. Together, we will continue to achieve great things and shape the future of our industry.







PROGRAM SERVICES AS A PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL REVENUE


Net Assets at Beginning of Year

EVENTS

- Revenue increased from previous year for the following key AAPL offerings: AAPL membership, Southwest Land Institute, Appalachian Land Institute, Mining and Land Resources Institute and Annual Meeting.
- ♠ Increased attendance from previous year for Southwest Land Institute (+50%), Appalachian Land Institute (+15%), Mining and Land Resources Institute by (+41%) and Annual Meeting (+8%).
- New Bitcoin Mining for Landmen event and Women in Energy Institute as well as spring Certification Exam Review in Fort Worth, Appalachian Land Institute and Annual Meeting all reached capacity.
- ♦ The Southwest Land Institute and Mining and Land Resources reached over 95% capacity.
- ♦ New cost-effective swag and signage allowed for a larger presence at in-person marketing events, AAPL educational events and NAPE.

LOCAL OUTREACH AND INVOLVEMENT

- Strengthened relationships with local associations and other regional organizations to help promote specific Energy Institutes, Annual Meeting and other in-person events as well as AAPL membership.
- Provided new marketing kits to local associations and other industry allies to promote AAPL offerings at their events.
- ♦ Social media collaborations with industry leaders like Oxy, Chesapeake, Devon, Liberty Energy/Chris Wright, Flipping the Barrel, Texas Blockchain and more.
- ♠ Social media collaborations with industry outsiders to spread industry awareness included ASCA, Cheers Bar, Trudy Cathy White and more.

- ♦ Updated compensation survey doubled response rate from most recent survey in 2022.
- ♠ Provided AAPL members with opportunities to shape public policy with in-depth analysis and access to submit public comments for proposed regulations at the federal and state level, including those from the Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Department of Energy, U.S. Department of Labor, U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, California Geologic Energy Management Division, Colorado Energy and Carbon Management Commission, New Mexico Environment Department, and the Texas Railroad Commission, among others.
- ♠ Executed industry awareness and recruitment campaigns with the American Association of School Counselors, including mailing 3,000 new recruitment brochures, exhibiting at their national conference in Atlanta in July, advertising in their ASCA School Counselor magazine and participating in their online industry spotlight.
- Joined national and regional partner energy groups and state oil and gas associations, such as the Independent Petroleum Association of America, American Exploration & Production Council, the Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Association, Texas Oil & Gas Association, and Western Energy Alliance, among others, to promote and support advocacy campaigns, regulatory proposals, and stakeholder outreach to protect a landman's right to work and support domestic energy exploration and production, both from traditional and renewable sources.
- Assisted AAPL members with inquiries for legislative, regulatory, and case intervention, including navigating the new Federal Trade Commission noncompete rulemaking that prohibits noncompete agreements for employees and independent contractors; coordinating with state partners to curb efforts to curtail independent contractor recognition in California,

Michigan, and Pennsylvania; providing a state-by-state guide to landman licensing requirements; and reviewing requests for AAPL amicus briefs in cases involving lease terminations, royalty disputes, and working interest owners.

SPECIAL INITIATIVES

- ♣ Filed an AAPL legal brief with the Texas Attorney
 General in opposition to the Texas Real Estate
 Commission request regarding whether those
 negotiating wind leases on behalf of another for
 compensation are required to hold a real estate license
 in Texas. AAPL was joined by numerous state lawmakers
 who supported the AAPL position that no licensing is
 required under state law.
- ♠ Delivered AAPL support letter to congressional representatives with the Professional Certification Coalition to advance bipartisan federal legislation to extend federal tax exemptions to AAPL members for certification and membership costs, including an official comment letter to the U.S. House of Representative Ways & Means Committee Chairman urging passage of the bill and extoling its benefits for AAPL members and the energy industry.
- ♠ Provided members with access, detailed analysis, and archives of video recordings for numerous federal and state legislative hearings, including witness testimony and bill markups on key pieces of legislation impacting members in all oil and gas and renewables producing jurisdictions.
- ♠ Tracked, analyzed, and reported on a record number of bills for members, provided biweekly governmental affairs bill tracking snap bill summaries, and published biweekly governmental affairs reports for members on monitored legislative, regulatory, and judicial matters – totaling hundreds of pages of content available exclusively for AAPL members.






MEMBERSHIP BY YEAR




TOTAL MEMBERSHIP VERSUS RENEWAL NUMBERS BY TYPE

MEMBERSHIP PERCENTAGE BY TYPE





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



CERTIFICATION NUMBERS BY CERTIFICATION LEVEL: FISCAL YEAR 2022 VS FISCAL YEAR 2023




TOTAL CERTIFICATIONS BY LEVEL

APPLICATIONS REVIEWED IN FISCAL YEAR 2023





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

2024 AAPL ANNUAL MEETING

BOSTON, MA | JUNE 18-19, 2024

The 70th Annual Meeting was held in Boston and was attended by nearly 600 land professionals from 29 states. Nine concurrent education sessions offered attendees numerous possibilities to earn continuing education credits, while a bonus education event, a Boston Robotics demonstration, three keynote sessions and two memorable evening events rounded out fantastic opportunities for learning and networking at the conference.

NAPE HIGHLIGHTS

♦ INTRODUCTION OF MINERALS AND NONOP HUB

In 2024, NAPE added the Minerals and NonOp Hub to the trade show floor, generating significant interest from both attendees and exhibitors. This addition provided a new focal point for the exhibition, enhancing the overall experience and engagement.

♦ GOVERNORS FORUM

NAPE 2024 hosted the Governors Forum, featuring Governor Kevin Stitt of Oklahoma and Governor Greg Abbott of Texas. Both governors shared their perspectives on the energy industry, providing valuable insights and fostering a deeper understanding of current industry dynamics.

♦ NAPE CHARITIES CELEBRATION RECEPTION

This year, NAPE reimagined the NAPE Charities Luncheon into a NAPE Charities Celebration Reception. The event featured live performances from Randy Rogers and Wade Bowen, creating a vibrant and engaging atmosphere that was well-received by attendees.

♦ ADVANCED PROGRAMMING

NAPE continued to offer advanced programming through established events such as the Job Fair, Energy Business Conference, Renewable Energy Hub, Bitcoin Mining Hub, Hall of Fame, and Energy Case Competition. These events provided valuable opportunities for professional development and industry networking.

♦ TRADE SHOW HIGHLIGHTS

The NAPE trade show remained a cornerstone of the industry, with over 280 prospects listed in the 2024 Prospect Guide. The trade show also featured new technology and services, showcasing the latest innovations and trends in the energy sector.

♦ NAPE CHARITIES GOLF TOURNAMENT

The NAPE Charities Golf Tournament had its best year financially, raising over \$80,000 for the NAPE Charities Fund. The event was a sell-out, highlighting the strong support and generosity of the NAPE community.
