
Rig counts drop again in Oklahoma and across the US

October 4, 2019



The rig counts in Oklahoma and across the





rest of the U.S. dropped again in the past week. The state's count fell 3 to 63. A year ago, there were 143 oil and gas rigs active in the state.

Nationally, the count fell by 5 to 855. Oil rigs fell by 3 to 710 and the number of gasdrilling rigs dropped by two to 144. In the past year, the oil and gas rig counts have slipped by 197 from 1,052. The number of oil rigs fell by 151 while the number of gas rigs dropped by 45.

The Permian Basin saw an increase of one

rig to reach 415. The Ardmore Woodford saw a count of 2 rigs in the past week which was unchanged from the previous week. The Arkoma Woodford remained at three working rigs.

The Granite Wash stayed at 2 working rigs compared to the 13 rigs reported one year ago. The Mississippian's count of 2 rigs remained the same. The D-J Basin in Colorado dropped one rig to reach 21. The Eagle Ford in South Texas slipped by 2 to 60 compared to the 78 working rigs a year earlier.

The Williston in North Dakota added 2 rigs to reach 55.

Oklahoma's count of 63 compares to 414 in Texas where the count dropped by four.



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
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Colorado lost one rig to reach 24.

The Red Top Rig Report from the Independent Oil and Gas Service in Wichita reported this week's rig count in Kansas was 37, down two.

Louisiana's count slipped by one to reach 55. New Mexico added four to reach 113 rigs. North Dakota added a rig to hit 54 working rigs while Wyoming's count declined by one to 33.

Oil Stocks' Dividends Are Rising. Investors Still Aren't Biting.



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For years, oil producers spent freely on new projects without apparent concern about the cash payoff. But investors are pushing back against that strategy, and it has clearly had an effect on management.





Their free cash flow yield—free cash flow per share as a percentage of the stock price—is now positive 2.2% over the past 12 months, up from an average of negative 4.6% over the past 10 years, according to Credit Suisse analyst William Featherston. Part of the reason is that producers have reined in spending, but the main factor for the rise in yield is that

the stocks have fallen. The SPDR S&P Oil & Gas Exploration & Production ETF (ticker: XOP) is down 23% this year, even as futures on West Texas Intermediate

crude, the market benchmark in the U.S., have risen 16%.

Oil companies have been raising dividends as they have produced more cash, but it doesn't seem to be enough to attract investors. Featherston downgraded three producers: Continental Resources (CLR), Range Resources (RRC), and Whiting Petroleum (WLL).

None of the companies responded to requests for comment.

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growth, above-average free cash flowyields, willingness to return cash to shareholders, and attractive relative valuation," he wrote. His favorite stocks include ConocoPhillips (COP), Diamondback Energy (FANG), Parsley Energy (PE), Pioneer Natural Resources (PXD), Marathon Oil (MRO), and Viper Energy Partners (VNOM).

One problem for the industry is that the overall S&P 500 still has a better free-cash-flow yield than oil producers, without the

commodity-related price risk they face. And even though the producers have fallen, they remain relatively more expensive than their historical valuations when valued based on cash flow.

"Thus, we expect this multiple de-rating trend will continue unless either we see a sustained rally in oil prices (unlikely absent a significant geopolitical event in our view given loosening supply/demand balances into 2020) and/or E&P equity valuations become so inexpensive on traditional

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metrics that it serves as a catalyst for the Majors to consolidate the sector," Featherston wrote.

QUARTERLY BOARD of DIRECTORS MEETING, Coeur d'Alene, ID September 15, 2019

The AAPL Quarterly Board Meeting was held on September 15, 2019 at the Coeur d'Alene Resort, Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Jay Beavers, AAPL President, called the meeting to Order. The Invocation was given by Mike Curry, followed by the introduction of guests and roll call of the Executive Committee, Directors and Committee Chairs. New Directors/Temporary and Sub-Directors were seated. Upon adoption of the Agenda, the minutes from the last board meeting on June 19, 2019 were adopted by acclamation.

Treasurer's Report: Jason Maloy, Treasurer, provided a report on AAPL and its affiliates for the period ending June 30, 2019 as follows:

- **AAPL, Inc.'s** total assets are \$40,117,609, while total liabilities are \$3,096,304.
- **Revenues** (exclusive of investment revenue) totaled \$7,785,808 as of June 30, 2019. This consists of \$1,798,903 from membership dues, \$2,976,878 from NAPE Expo distribution, \$813,352 from educational seminar fees, \$813,771 NAPE management fees, and annual meeting income of \$709,806
- Expenses through June 30, 2019 totaled \$6,981,623. Expenses include general and administrative (\$3,991,922), publications (\$440,028), educational program (\$629,763), financial expenses (\$334,627), board of director meeting expenses (\$344,396), annual meeting expense (\$542,803) and IT/software expenses (\$512,711).
- **Investments** as of June 30, 2019 are \$30.044,461 which is an increase of \$3,125,264.
- As of June 30, 2019, the **Education Foundation, Inc.'s** balance sheet reflects \$4,394,565, which is an increase of \$212,407 as compared to the same period last year. The Statement of Investment Accounts reflects \$4,281,962 total monies invested which is an increase of \$294,409 as compared to the same period last year.
- As of June 30, 2019, the **Landman Scholarship Trust's** balance sheet reflects \$7,811,987, which is an increase of \$306,619 as compared to the same period last year. The Statement of Investment Accounts reflects \$7,744,261 total monies invested, which is an increase of \$274,465 as compared to the same period last year.

Questions from the Field

Timothy C. Dowd ELIAS BOOKS BROWN & NELSON

Q: I examined an Oil and Gas Lease that leased the NW/4 of the section. The mineral owner also owned a tract in the E/2 SE/4.

The Oil and Gas Lease has a clause at the bottom that recites "It is the intent of the Lessor to lease, and Lessor does hereby grant, demise, lease and let unto Lessee, all oil, gas and other minerals owned by Lessor in Section X, Township X, Range X, X County, OK whether or not properly and completely described herein."

Does the recorded lease, in fact, cover the E/2 SE/4? Does the lease constitute constructive notice to third parties? – L.C.

A: A recent case came out which gives guidance on this issue. In the 2019 case of Riverbend Land, LLC v. State of Oklahoma, the issue involved a Deed which gave a par-

ticular description and then added a phrase of "...together with all abutters rights." The issue was whether or not the abutting land, which was not described, was validly conveyed by the grantor to the grantee, and whether the recorded Deed constituted constructive notice.

The Oklahoma court held that the Deed did not constitute constructive notice to third parties.

As to the present questions, the lease from the lessor to a lessee is valid between the parties. However, because the Oil and Gas Lease in question did not specifically describe the E/2 SE/4, when recorded, it is not going to constitute constructive notice to a third party. However, a field landman checking records would possibly encounter this lease and could then be on actual notice of the existence of the language that it covered the additional land (being the E/2 SE/4). However, if another oil company, without notice of the existence of the first lease and the special clause, took a second lease that validly described the E/2 SE/4, then the second lease would be the superior lease as to the E/2 SE/4.

Q. What is one unique thing about you?


A. I serve on the board of a Christian youth camp named Camp Lu-Jo KISMIF located in southwest Oklahoma.

In addition, the AAPL is responsible for booking the lodging for the speaker at the host hotel, or closest hotel to the location of the event. The AAPL reimburses the following: Hotel expense, airfare (coach), rental car or Uber/Taxi, Mileage to and from airport (Current IRS rate), Baggage Fees and Meals. All reimbursements require receipts and are paid within 30 days of submitting.

SPEAKER EXPECTATIONS
